Minister's Reflections

"By Whose Authority?"

Ever in discussion among Unitarian Universalists is the question "By whose authority"? I think it is the Alpha and Omega question of our free faith. It is one that makes or breaks ministers and congregations. A less flowery way of expressing it is to ask: "Who's in charge here?" Another way of saying the same thing is: "Who does s/he think s/he is?" Further elucidation of the latter question occasionally adds some more words as a possible response: "...the Pope or something?" "...God Almighty?"

In fact, reams have been written on this question. The Protestant movement - symbolized by Martin Luther when he nailed those Ninety-Five Theses on the door of All Saints Church in Wittenberg, Germany on October 31, 1517 - asked this as a foundational question in breaking away from the Catholic hierarchy.

In regard to First Parish Brewster Unitarian Universalist, the question has been discussed, presumably in one way or another, since the church was "gathered" in 1700.

And it has been a seminal one for me with this congregation during the year that I have been serving as your Developmental Minister.

Indeed, I have heard many of your opinions on this question in regard to past ministers and in regard to me. And it will be a question that must be more clearly answered by this congregation before it can, in good conscience, call a Settled Minister. Or at least, that is my opinion.

Truly, it is not an easy question to answer, but it is an essential one for First Parish Brewster Unitarian Universalist to address.

Now, it is not much of a leap of faith among Unitarian Universalists to say that the ultimate authority of congregational matters is decided by the congregation.

But working this out in with each other - and with a minister - is a very subtle process - one not easily accomplished.

It is essential, therefore, that a congregation and a minister within the Unitarian Universalist tradition be very real and very specific in expectations of one another. And right from the beginning of the relationship!

Hopefully, by this time next year you will have chosen a Ministerial Search Committee. That is, if you decide that is what you want to do. I think you will be ready then. And I have heard many of you express your wish not to have yet another Interim or Developmental Minister when I complete my time with you two years from now.

But you still need to work diligently for all this to happen. The Vision/Mission/Covenant process we are undertaking for the next two years will help guide various aspects of congregational identity, including discussing the question "By Whose Authority?"

You are a wonderful congregation - and a wonderfully complex one, too. And you hopefully you will be careful and quite sure in eventually choosing future ministerial leadership that reflects who you are and where you want to go as a congregation.

Helping you get to that point is a primary task of why I was appointed by the UUA and approved by your Board of Trustees as your Developmental Minister. So let us continue with good intentions and with hard work to achieve that task - and always to do so in the name of love.

This has been a wonderful 5 years. This congregation has a long story of commitment to children, youth and families. I give thanks to this beloved community for the wonder of this work, for the beauty of these collaborations and for the shared journey of 'opening hearts, growing souls and turning love into justice.'

My summer plans include a 6 week sojourn to the west coast of Ireland, the land where my mother grew up and I played as a child. I am going to wander, write poetry and connect to the spirit of the place. I look forward to returning again in August, refreshed and ready to begin again, with you all.

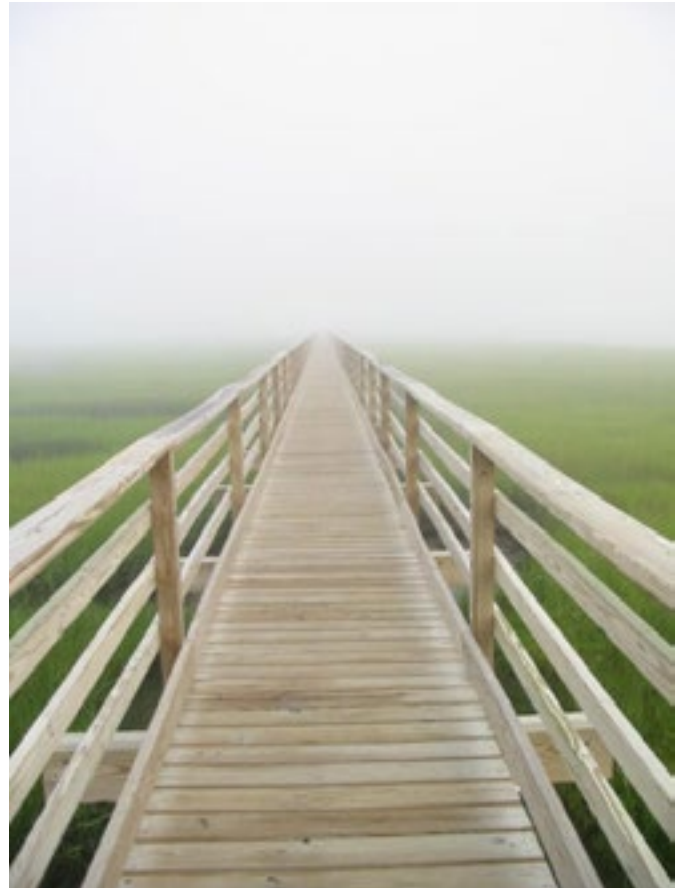
Beginning the visioning process together next church year

It will be a multigenerational effort, which very much includes the children and youth.

As every UU congregation is different, it is very important that we understand clearly who we are and where we want to go before we can begin our search. And as Rev. Don says, it is his job as our Developmental Minister to help us to understand that.
